FRANCOFÊTE 2015

A UNIQUE EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCE FOR OUR STUDENTS

Teaching French is a strategic priority at Akiva School. Our key objective is to develop a bilingual and independent student, and, in order to do this, we rely on the latest best practise in educational research. We want our French learning to flow beyond traditional reading, writing and communication skills, to encompass higher order thinking and meaning. Take for example, Akiva's Francofête 2015, our week long celebration of French at the school. This year, students from kindergarten to grade 6 were engaged and inspired in French by looking at the world through the eyes of Jules Verne and visiting his house in France. They learned about Tour du monde en quatre-vingts jours/Around the World in Eighty Days in literature, of Vingt mille lieues sous la mer/ Twenty Thousand Leagues Under The Sea in Art, of Voyage au centre de la terre/Journey to the Center of The Earth in Science, and of the Eiffel Tower in Geometry and in Poetry. We touched on the Universal Exhibition and had the opportunity to speak with someone who has actually been among the stars, former astronaut and MP Marc Garneau. Students experienced a vision of the French in such a way that it became not just a language but an educational tool for today and tomorrow.

FOCUS ON STEM AT AKIVA

The educational acronym STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. A STEM educational approach means enhancing traditional Math and Science curriculum through the infusion of technology and engineering concepts. That's exactly what went on at Akiva this year through a variety of new curricular and extracurricular learning initiatives that encouraged problem-solving, discovery, exploratory learning, and actively engaging in a situation in order to find its solution.

ROBOTICS AND CODING CURRICULUM

This year Akiva integrated software coding into our academic curriculum. Students from kindergarten to grade 6 explored different coding programs in which they were able to develop their problem solving and creative thinking skills. All grades learned the fundamentals of programming, leading up to making apps, games, and animations. Younger grades worked with visual representations of programming commands while older grades used a combination of visual and text-based programming. Kindergarten and grade 1 created coding algorithms to build their own robots through our Robotics program. Grades 2, 3 and 4 learned basic programming to develop animations and interactive stories through an MIT-based software application called "Scratch". Grades 5 and 6 did both Robotics and Scratch as complementary coding applications.

STEM DAY AT AKIVA

On February 10th, Akiva held a school wide celebration of STEM through the theme of outer space. Students participated in a variety of Science, Technology, Engineering and Math activities throughout the day and were treated to a special visit from the McGill Astrophysics team. The McGill team led numerous fun Science and Physics workshops for the students including "make your own space comet".

SCIENCE AT LUNCHTIME

Every week, students were able to do hands-on Science projects with Akiva teacher Drew Rothman at lunchtime.

ENGINEERING AT LUNCHTIME

New this year, students were able to delve into the basic concepts of Engineering at lunchtime with Akiva teacher and Engineer Brad Kaplin. They built structures and proved basic theories of Physics, all while having fun!



THE AKIVA ORGANIC GARDEN PROJECT AN INTERDISCIPLINARY LEARNING EXPERIENCE AND LESSON IN JEWISH VALUES

True 21st century learning is interdisciplinary, integrated and project-based. In September, Akiva students started work on a wonderful example of 21st century learning with a project outside of the traditional classroom environment and even outside of the building! Students in kindergarten and grade 6 worked together to create the very first Akiva organic vegetable garden, complete with our own Akiva scarecrow Ovadiah. Working with local organic vegetable gardener, Shawn Manning, from Urban Seedling, students built their garden framework, prepared the soil and planted Deer Tongue, Oak Leaf, Red Salad Bowl and Parris Island lettuce. Throughout the year while caring for their vegetables (taking a break for winter of course), classes visited the garden and leveraged it for various areas of learning. Students learned about nature, plant growth and the role of agriculture in our lives. Some classes used the garden for fun Math and Science activities while others learned about traditional Jewish values associated with agriculture and caring for the land. The vegetables grown in the garden were shared with the local "Meals on Wheels" community food service and students learned important lessons in social justice as they used what they had grown to help others in society. As part of the grade 6 Judaic studies unit on Birchat Hamazon (Blessing for our Food), the Teva Learning Center, a Jewish-based environmental educational organization, used the garden as reference to speak to grade 6 students.

After graduating Akiva School in 1980, David continued his Jewish education at Bialik High School and then went on to graduate from Emerson College in 1991 where he completed a Bachelor in Fine Arts in Musical Theatre. David starred in several Canadian productions, including a lead role in the hit Canadian show "Time Of Your Life" which ran for 150 episodes. He moved to Los Angeles in 1991 where he has established himself as a versatile actor, having sustained an incredibly successful career spanning across Film, TV and Theatre.

David just wrapped on a movie called "Exodus to Shanghai", to be released later this year, telling the story of how the Chinese saved many Jews from Vienna by issuing visas to Shanghai. This was an especially important movie for David as his grandparents fled the Nazis in Vienna in 1938 at the same time this film was set.

David remembers Akiva School for teaching him to always be engaged, motivated and enjoying what you are doing, rather than just focussing on the end results. David's favourite memories of his time at Akiva School include the many plays and Chagigahs in which he took part - perhaps the first spark of his future acting career!

On May 11th Akiva School held our second annual Anti-Bullying Day. This year we decided to highlight one of Akiva's five promises; "treat others with kindness". At Akiva, we always emphasize the idea that kindness is contagious: do a random act of kindness for someone and they will, in turn, do an act of kindness for someone else. We like to call this "the domino effect of kindness". Students quickly learn that when they make others feel good they naturally feel good themselves.

The day kicked off with an all school assembly where students from various grades shared acts of kindness that they have done. A few of the Bat Mitzvah girls presented their ideas on "Mitzvah Goreret Mitzvah", how one good deed brings another good deed. Students were then challenged to be conscious of one act of kindness that they did throughout the day. Each student wrote out their act of kindness on a domino piece which was then linked together throughout the school to display Akiva's domino effect of kindness. Although we decided to dedicate our Anti-Bullying Day this year to kindness, we are proud to say it truly is part of our everyday life at Akiva.
